


Messages from the East:

Some Interesting Masonic Trivia:

- Winnedumah Lodge #287 of Bishop, CA holds its meetings at 270 feet below sea level, the lowest lodge in North America.
- In 1954 Martin's Station Lodge No. 188 of VA was opened 952 feet below the surface of Cumberland Mountain in Cudjo's Cave, which lies between Cumberland Gap, Tenn. and Middlesboro, KY. 345 Masons were present and a Master Mason degree was conferred.
- On November 10, 1928, the Grand Lodge of California held a special communication at Culver City, to lay the corner stone of the Masonic temple. The lodge room was so crowded that the Grand Lodge officers were unable to enter. They retired to the Ladies' powder room to open the grand lodge for the ceremony.
- On June 7, 1921, Mystic Lodge #21 of Red Bank, NJ had conferred half of the Master Mason degree on brother Lyman C. Van when the power went out. He didn't receive the rest of the degree for several weeks, making him for a time, a "two and half degree" mason.

Grand Lodge Annual Communication Amendment Voting Results - 09/27/2019

Amendment 1 – APPROVED

This amendment would raise the per capita rate owed to the Grand Lodge to \$25.00 from its current rate of \$20.00.

Substitute Amendment 1 – DEFEATED

This amendment would increase the Grand Lodge Per Capita \$5.00 effective December 31, 2019; \$5.00 effective December 31, 2022; \$5.00 effective December 31, 2025. – Submitted by the Grand Lodge Finance Committee.

Amendment 2 – APPROVED

This amendment would require the Grand Lodge to collect \$1.00 a year on all its Per Capita tax members on roll as of December 31, for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. – Submitted by Sophia Lodge # 767

Amendment 3 – APPROVED

This amendment would require brothers to immediately notify the Secretary of their Lodge of changes in contact information. – Submitted by Mount Holly Lodge # 544

Amendment 4 – DEFEATED

This amendment would require a majority vote to approve an Honorary Member. – Submitted by Stedman Lodge # 730

Amendment 5 – WITHDRAWN

This amendment would administratively suspend the membership of a member who has been charged with a felony. – Submitted by Oak Grove Lodge # 750



Masonic Education: The Level, Plumb, and Square

The Lodge meeting is almost over, all the business has been conducted and everyone has had their opportunity to speak their concerns and revelations about our great fraternal order, and the impact it has on our wonderful Lodge. The Worshipful Master has made the last call for any comments from the assembled body and is proceeding to close the Lodge.

By this time, most of us are winding down from the meeting and getting ready to go home. After all, this is just the Lodge closing formalities that we have listened to hundreds of times and it is the same thing we heard at opening, just an hour ago.

The next time you have the opportunity to witness the closing formalities of a Lodge, I challenge you to listen carefully to the last part – just before the closing charge and dismissal.

We meet upon the Level, act upon the Plumb, and part upon the Square. These are more than just words that are said before you get to go home. They are the very foundation and strength of how Masons should act – to all mankind. Think about those simple, yet significant words, and what they mean to you and how you conduct yourself in your day-to-day interactions with others.

WE MEET UPON THE LEVEL

All men are equal in the eyes of The Great Architect of the Universe and our fraternal order. Material wealth or station in life does not make a man a better Mason, one over another. The rich man leaves his wealth outside the Lodge and the poor man finds respect and brotherly love around our altar. And when we are finally called to that "house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens", we are not sorted out based on status or stature, we are treated as equals, truly meeting upon the Level.

But do we really treat all men as equal? Do we have some unkind word or thought about a fellow man, be they a co-worker, friend, neighbor, or even Brother Mason? Dealing with problems can be very difficult, and we are but frail human beings that have many faults and deficiencies. Yet we can still meet upon the Level and solve any problem, yet still treating all men with respect and dignity, as we search for solutions together.

WE ACT UPON THE PLUMB

It is the rule and guide of a Mason to preserve an upright appearance before God, Mason and mankind; and that we honor our faith and give each man his due. We should walk upright in virtue's way, leaning to neither side, and remember that the Supreme Architect of the Universe reads what is in our hearts and bears witness to all that is true.




AND WE PART UPON THE SQUARE

Parting upon the Square reminds us to always square our actions with all mankind, treating each other with equal reverence and dignity. After all, no man is accepted as a Mason because of his worldly wealth or status; so why should we make that a standard for dealing with others?

Do we really treat all with equal reverence and dignity? I believe we all want to; and try to. But are we always successful? Do we look down on the penniless man on the street corner of life, or do we offer assistance at a level not to impede our own moral or financial stability?

These important reminders are given to us all, just before parting Lodge, in an attempt to remind us how we should deal with mankind. Reality and human nature can make meeting these goals difficult. But how hard do we **REALLY** try?





Masonic Education: Why do we say "Blue Lodge"??

We have always heard of the term "Blue Lodge". What does the term Blue" mean, and why are we using the "Blue Lodge" in present conversation?

Some authorities think that as blue has, from ancient Biblical times, been associated with truth, with Diety, with wisdom and hope; that, as Mackey taught, the blue of the Old Testament is a translation of the Hebrew "tekelet", which is derived from a root meaning "perfection", and the color blue came into Masonry as its color by natural association. Others believe that as our ancient Brethren met on hills and in vales, over which the blue vault of heaven is a ceiling, that the covering of a lodge is the clouded canopy or starry decked heaven. These allusions seem to connote that blue, the color of the sky, is that of all celestial attributes for which Freemasons strive. "

Brother Harry E. Heinkel from Henry L. Palmer Lodge No. 301, Milwaukee, asked the same question: "Why do we say 'Blue Lodge'"? His findings are most interesting. At the risk of being termed a Masonic symbologist, he questioned and criticized the propriety of the term "Blue Lodge" when Freemasons speak of the Masonic Lodge of symbolic degrees: The term is peculiarly American; it is found nowhere else in the Masonic world. Evidence does not support the conclusion that the color Blue is the symbol of the three symbolic degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry, whether Operative or Speculative, in time immemorial or of the present. That "Blue" is a significant or characteristic symbol of Freemasonry is not supported by the ritual. No pointed reference is made to it " in the three symbolic degrees. "Blue is emphatically the color of Freemasonry," wrote one authority. But the color of the United Grand Lodge of England is Garter (Oxford) Blue, while that of private (subordinate) lodges is Cambridge Blue, and the Grand Steward's Lodges in London, known as the "Red Apron" Lodges use crimson, thought to be suggested by the color of the ribbon of the Order of the Bath. The color of the Grand Lodge of Scotland is thistle green, while daughter (subordinate) lodges adopt a color of their choice. The recently instituted Grand Lodge of India adopted three colors, the Garter Blue of England, the Thistle Green of Scotland and the Sky Blue of Ireland. This is in honor of the three Grand Lodges by whom it was instituted.

Could the color Blue have been adopted when Blue Ribbons were attached to the Aprons? Perhaps, but aprons which can be seen in the museum in Freemasons Hall, London are evidence that prior to and during the early years following the formation of the Grand Lodge in 1717, Aprons were white and of a considerable size. Rather than "Blue Lodge" Brother Heinkel prefers to proudly claim to be member of a "Masonic Lodge" which is understood by Freemasons and non-Masons throughout the world.

How and when the term "Blue Lodge" came to be known as the color of Freemasonry is yet to be discovered, but in present day usage, the term "Blue Lodge" identifies the membership and organization of Freemasons under the authority of the Grand Lodge.
